

Take a Closer Look: Cook Islands SPCA - Rarotonga

We are going to learn all about the Cook Islands SPCA and how to care for animals in the heat.

The Cook Islands SPCA in Rarotonga are responsible for the care of stray, abused, and homeless animals. Their mission is to enhance animal welfare and educate the Rarotonga people on best practices animal care.

The Cook Islands SPCA is a small team of devoted volunteers who run an SPCA Op Shop, kennel site, weekly raffles, quizzes, and garage sales. They also respond to daily calls from the public concerning animals and help transport animals who require veterinary attention. Similar to SPCA New Zealand, a current focus for the Cook Islands SPCA desexing to help keep the dog population under control.

Rarotonga is a tropical island and even in winter can have high temperatures and UV levels.

Let's learn how to be a responsible animal guardian when it is hot!

- Give your animal companions shade and vet-approved sunscreen to protect their skin.
- Avoid letting your dog stay on hot concrete or black sand for too long. Their body temperature can rise quickly, and their paw pads are sensitive and can easily get burned.
- During summer or hot weather, swimming can be one of the best activities for your dog, if they enjoy it. Take them for a swim with a responsible adult.
- Check your animal's water bowls regularly and make sure they are filled with fresh, clean, cool water every day.
- When going to the beach with your dog, always bring fresh water for them to drink. They cannot drink seawater as it can make them sick.



Kind Conservation: Sea Turtles - Honu



Did you know that sea turtles do not only live in warm tropical places like the Cook Islands, but they also spend time living around New Zealand? Five different species of sea turtles spend time in New Zealand's waters. All five species are endangered or even critically endangered, but not to fear there are ways that YOU can help these vulnerable marine animals!

New Zealand is the home to the Leatherback turtle, Green turtle, Loggerhead turtle, Hawksbill turtle and Olive Ridley turtle. Most of these turtles are seen around the harbours and bays of the North Island, where the water is warmer. Turtle sightings on beaches are becoming more common, which is not common for New Zealand. This is because more sea turtles are becoming sick from pollution, entangled in old fishing nets and hurt by boats.

In warmer countries, turtles come on to beaches to nest and lay their eggs.

We are very lucky that there are organisations working together to look after these beautiful marine reptiles that live in New Zealand waters:

- Injured or stranded turtles are rescued by The Department of Conservation (DOC).
- The Auckland Zoo vet team provide veterinary care for the sea turtles.
- Kelly Tarlton's give turtles needing rehabilitation a temporary home while they are getting healthy and ready to be released back into the ocean.

Title: Marine Life Matters



Poem







Craft: Egg Carton Green Turtle

Materials needed:


- > White card
- > Green pencil
- > Normal pencil
- > Hot glue gun + hot glue stick
- > Googly eyes x 2
- > Vivid
- > Green paint
- > Paint brush
- > Scissors
- > Egg carton



Instructions



1 Use the scissors (carefully) and cut one egg holder out of the egg carton.



2 Place the egg carton on top of your chosen paper.



3 Draw the shape of your sea turtle around the single egg carton on your paper (don't forget its tail).



4 Paint the egg holder green with a paintbrush and wait for it to dry.



5 Colour in your green turtle using a green pencil.



6 Cut around the outline of your sea turtle.




7 Once it is dry, use a vivid to draw lines on your egg carton.



8 Hot glue the googly eyes and egg holder to your green turtle.



9 Make your green turtle some friends to swim around with!
