FAQ's

How old do I have to be to volunteer?

> To volunteer on-site at any of our SPCA Centres, you need to be at least 16 years old. Our Op Shops take volunteers 15 years and up. However, if you are younger than 15, there are many other ways to get involved! More on the inside of this flyer.

Do I need prior experience to volunteer?

> No prior experience necessary! We provide all training, materials and guidance in whatever you need.

Donate Goods

Foster

Your family may also be interested in becoming a foster family.

Fostering is when volunteers give animals a temporary home and provide them with care, medical treatment (if required) and socialisation before they are ready to find their new forever home. SPCA supplies everything you need to be a foster family.

To foster for SPCA, the person taking responsibility for foster animals needs to be at least 18 years old. However, your parent or guardian can take this role and support you with your fostering duties.
