When 8-year-old Brooke, a student at Torbay School, heard that SPCA was in need of towels and blankets for the animals, she was determined to help. With the wonderful idea of organizing a collection at her school, Brooke designed and distributed posters advertising the items needed, communicated with her schoolmates, and carefully decorated and delivered collection boxes to her school's classrooms. Brooke checked the boxes each day and after a month, she delivered the items to her local SPCA Centre. Way to go Brooke – thank you on behalf of SPCA staff and animals!



The Importance of Microchipping

A microchip is a tiny computer chip – about the size of a grain of rice. Each microchip is linked with a unique ID number and is inserted under your companion animal's skin by a vet. The chip can be scanned at vet clinics, SPCA Centres, and other animal shelters to identify your pet. Once scanned, all of the information that would also be on a collar and identification tags: name, address, and phone numbers, can be accessed. Microchips are essential because they can never fall off or be removed like a collar.

Microchipping is important all year round, however, with all of the festivities happening around the holidays, it is essential to make sure your companion animal is microchipped and that your details are updated. Guests, parties, loud noises, and travel – these situations can cause your companion animal to become uneasy or scared. If your companion animal gets lost in the chaos, it's much easier to be reunited with them if they are microchipped.





Impressive enrichment initiative!

Some passionate students from Westlake Boys' High School reached out to SPCA to see how they could volunteer their time to help animals in need. The students decided they wanted to make enrichment toys for the cats and kittens to enjoy while they waited to find their forever homes. They mailed in some creative toys that helped SPCA ensure the wellbeing of the cats and kittens! Thank you for your kindness Westlake Boys' High school!



Toys for the animals!

Blake took part in the William Pike Challenge this year and chose to do something to help animals in need for his community service hours. Nick and Waititi

Nick and Waititi are two 13-year-old dogs who were rescued by an SPCA Inspector. Nick and Waititi spent months in the care of SPCA to recover and find a new, loving, forever home - one that could provide them with everything they needed to be happy and healthy.

This senior duo was very lucky to find the perfect home with a new guardian who gives them everything they need. Their new guardian reports:

"Nick and Waititi are just the loveliest dogs and I can't believe my luck! They've settled in really well - they're great company and put big smiles on everyone's faces. Waititi is his energetic and curious self, and sneaks into my room to look at himself in the mirror. Nick is improving in leaps and bounds (literally) from when he first arrived, when he was noticeably stiff with arthritis. He's now jumping on the couch like a gazelle and doing zoomies (well, old-man zoomies) on the lawn.



Parker

When a small ginger kitten arrived at SPCA, it was clear that she had suffered a serious injury. X-rays revealed that she had been in an accident that caused all of the toes on both of her front paws to break.

Our amazing SPCA staff leapt into action to help the injured kitten – they applied splints to both of her front legs and wrapped her paws in bandages to help them heal. Because her bandages made her look like she was wearing boxing gloves, SPCA decided to call her Parker after the boxer, Joe Parker – the perfect name for a resilient kitten!

After spending a few weeks in the care of SPCA, Parker was ready to recover in a temporary foster home. Over time, she began to use her front legs again and was soon ready to come back to SPCA to be adopted!

Parker had a rough start over her first year of life, but luckily she was able to make a full recovery and was adopted by a loving family.



Chocolate and River

Chocolate was brought to SPCA because she wasn't the right fit for her guardians. River was lucky to be found and taken to SPCA after he was living on the streets, lost and alone. Although Chocolate and River came from very different pasts, it didn't stop them from becoming the very best of friends when their paths crossed at SPCA.

Though they now no longer had to spend their lives alone, they were still looking for their forever family. Luckily, the perfect person met and fell in love with the pair and adopted them.

"They are such cute little bunnies and everyone in our family loves them!" their new mum says.

"They seem to be settling in well at our home and even the dog and cat don't seem to mind having some new friends around the house! They spend most of their days outside in the backyard (except the freezing ones!) and they have learnt how to use the cat flap! They have a very nice hutch outside that I don't think they've even used once – they prefer the nice warm house."
