SPCA's Top Photography Tips





1. Hold your camera steady

Holding your camera still and steady is important to capture crisp, sharp images. If you shake or move too much - you'll likely end up with a blurry image.



2. Pay attention to the background

Creating a good photograph isn't just about the animal - pay attention to the background to ensure it compliments the animal and does not distract.



3. Get on the animal's level

Taking photo from a low level can bring a unique perspective to your photography. This helps you and the viewer see things from the animal's world.



4. Think about lighting

Lighting can be tricky but it's important that you take your photo without too much shadow or too much light so that you can see the animal clearly.



5. Animal care

Making sure the animal is comfortable and having a positive experience is of the utmost importance. Safe treats and remaining calm and quiet really helps.



6. Have fun!

Photography is all about having fun. Experiment with your shots, get creative, take lots of photos, and make sure the animal is having fun too!

Kind Conservation: Pekapeka-touroa/long-tailed bat

At the end of 2021, the Te Manu Rongonui/Bird of the Year competition came to a close. This annual competition, held by Forest and Bird, helps to raise awareness about Aotearoa's native wildlife, the habitats they live in, and the threats that they face.

Animal lovers across the country casted their vote for New Zealand's Bird of the Year – and if you haven't heard yet, the winner may surprise you!

This is because the 2021 winner isn't a bird at all but rather, an endemic

mammal – the pekapeka-tou-roa, or long-tailed bat.

This is the first time that a mammal has been included in the competition and therefore, the first time a mammal has won as well.

Weighing only 8-11 grams and measuring about the size of a thumb, the long tailed bat is unfortunately critically endangered. This is why it is so important for us to help protect them and their habitats.

Long-tailed bats can be found on both the North and South Islands, as well as Stewart Island, Littler Barrier, Great Barrier, and Kapiti Island.

The Department of Conservation (DOC) works hard to establish new populations of pekapeka - but there are still heaps of ways you can get involved and help these small brown beauties. Read on to learn how!

Fun Facts:

Take a look at the awesome fun pekapeka-tou-roa/long-tailed bat facts below!

- 1. It is believed that long-tailed bats only have one baby per year.
- 2. Long-tailed bats can fly approximately 60 km per hour.
- 3. Long-tailed bats are insectivores, with moths, midges mosquitoes, and beetles being their favourite snack.
- 4. Long-tailed bats fly along forest edges at dusk.
- 5. Just like other bats, long-tailed bats use echolocation (sound waves sent out that reflect off of objects) to determine where they are when flying and what's in front of them. However, unlike with other bats, some people can hear the long-tailed bats echolocation calls.





How you can help:

One of the biggest threats to the long-tailed bats is habitat loss. Check out the ways that you can help protect these vulnenrable animals:

- > Volunteer to replant and restore areas of native forests
- > Never litter
- > When visiting forests, stick to the paths
- > Give wildlife space and respect
- > Help spread the word about the challenges pekapeka face
- > Write a polite email/letter to the government urging futher protection of forest and bush habitats

Craft: Pekapeka Pom Pom Pencil Topper

Materials needed

- > Black and
- > Pencils
- brown yarn
- > Scissors
- > Hot glue gun
- > Black craft
- > Googly eyes
- paper or felt





Instructions



First, use SPCA's <u>pom pom ball</u> <u>instructions</u> to make a pom pom.



Fluff up the pom pom when you remove it from the carboard.



Cut wing and ear shapes from your craft paper or felt.



Glue the wings and ear to your pom pom to make your bat.



Glue the googly eyes on in the middle of the pom pom.



Glue your bat onto the top of your pencil.
