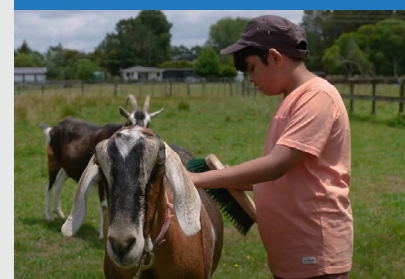

Be an Animal Hero!



Become the Superhero Every Animal Needs!

Do you enjoy playing fetch with your dog or brushing your cat's soft fur? If you have animals at home or want to learn how to be the BEST animal guardian you can be, this section is for you!

Animals need heroes every day - and that hero could be YOU! Being an animal guardian means helping animals stay happy, healthy and safe. You don't need superpowers - just kindness and care.

Why Do Animals Need Heroes?

Animals aren't toys, and they're definitely not funny-looking humans! Animals are living, breathing creatures with their own personalities and feelings. Yes, they feel - just like we do!

- They feel **pain** when they're hurt.
- They feel **hunger** when they need food.
- They feel **fear** when something scares them.
- They feel **happiness** when they're cared for.
- They feel **loneliness** when they're left alone too long.



When we understand why animals do what they do, and what they need to stay healthy and happy, we can be the best guardians possible.

What Does Being an Animal Guardian Mean?

It means:

- Caring for their needs - food, water, shelter and love.
- Keeping them safe - regular vet checks and making sure their home is clean and secure.
- Respecting their feelings - never hurting or scaring them.
- Protecting their world - keeping beaches, parks and forests clean so wildlife can thrive.

Every time you feed your pet, give them fresh water, play with them or help protect nature, you're being an animal hero!

Top Tips for Animal Heroes

Want to be a true guardian? Here are some easy ways:

- **Fresh clean water every day** - it's as important as food!
- **Clean homes** - whether it's a hutch, aquarium, paddock or kennel, keep it tidy.
- **Play time matters** - animals need fun and exercise to stay happy.
- **Wildlife safety** - never feed wild animals human food; it can harm them.
- **Protect nature** - pick up your rubbish and recycle to keep habitats safe.

4. Tick your chores off as you do them each day.



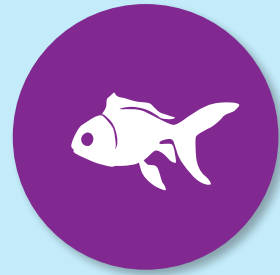
Caring for Animals

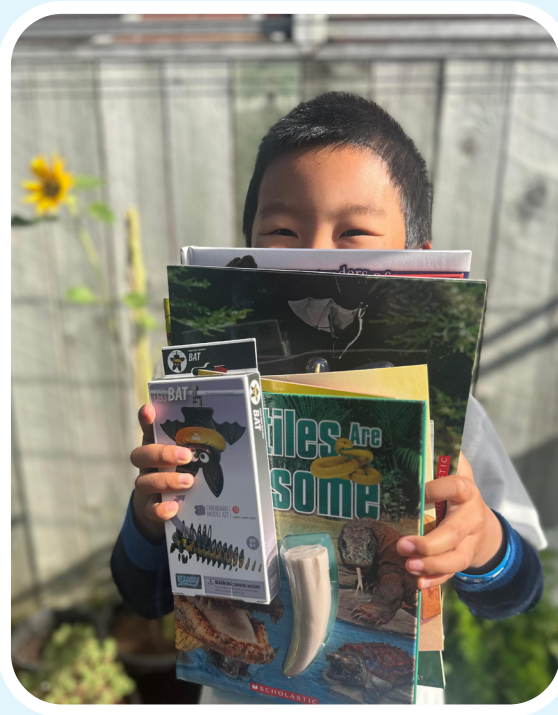
What was the book about? What was your favourite part? Why?

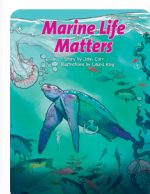
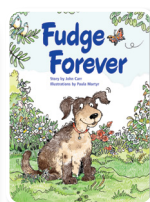
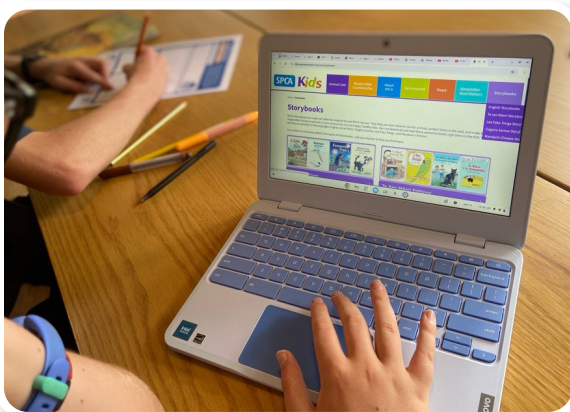


Storybooks - new on the Kids' Portal!

Spot the Difference



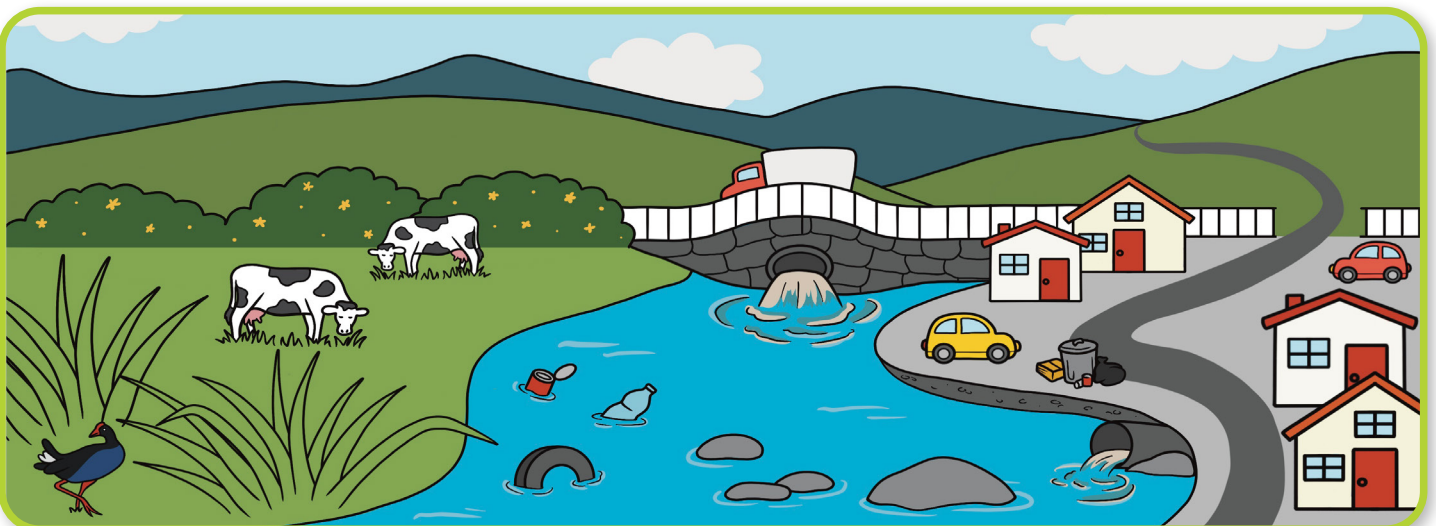
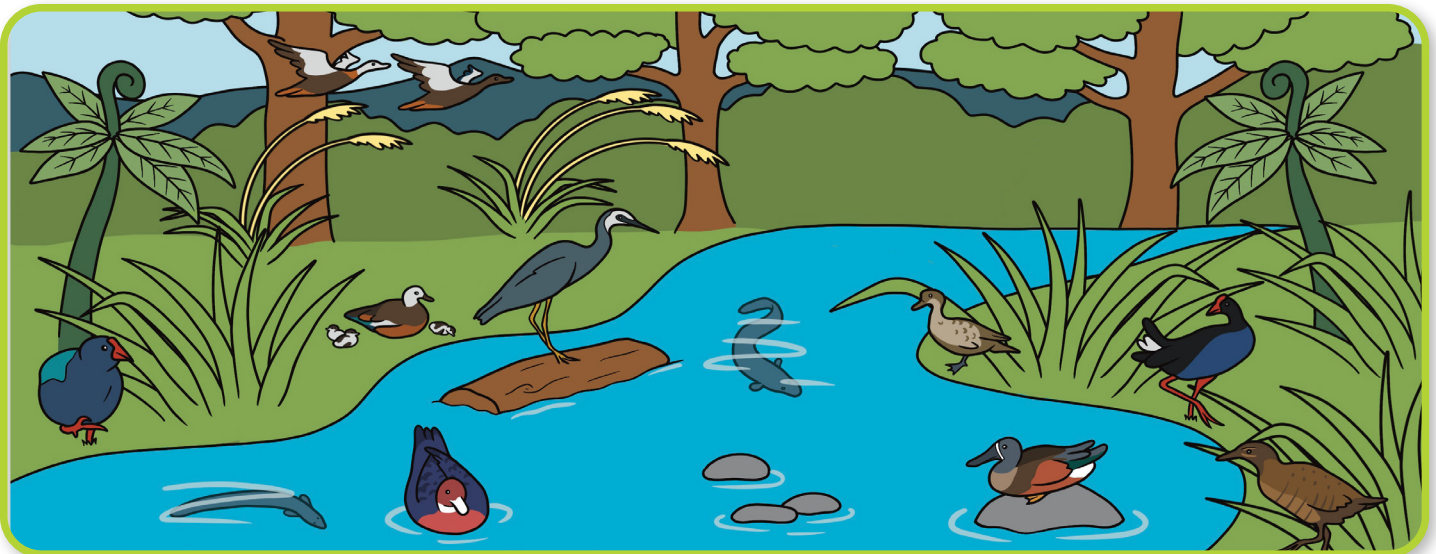
Freshwater and wetland habitats are home to many important New Zealand plants, birds, insects and fish. These habitats include lakes, rivers, swamps and streams. Sadly, 90% of our wetlands have been destroyed, mostly because of farming and houses being built on or near them.

Look at the two pictures below. The first shows a healthy freshwater habitat before humans arrived. The second shows how things have changed now that people are living in Aotearoa.

As an animal hero, you can help protect animals living in freshwater and wetland habitats by:

- Planting native plants near waterways.
- Keeping rubbish out of streams and rivers.
- Learning how human actions affect animals and their homes.

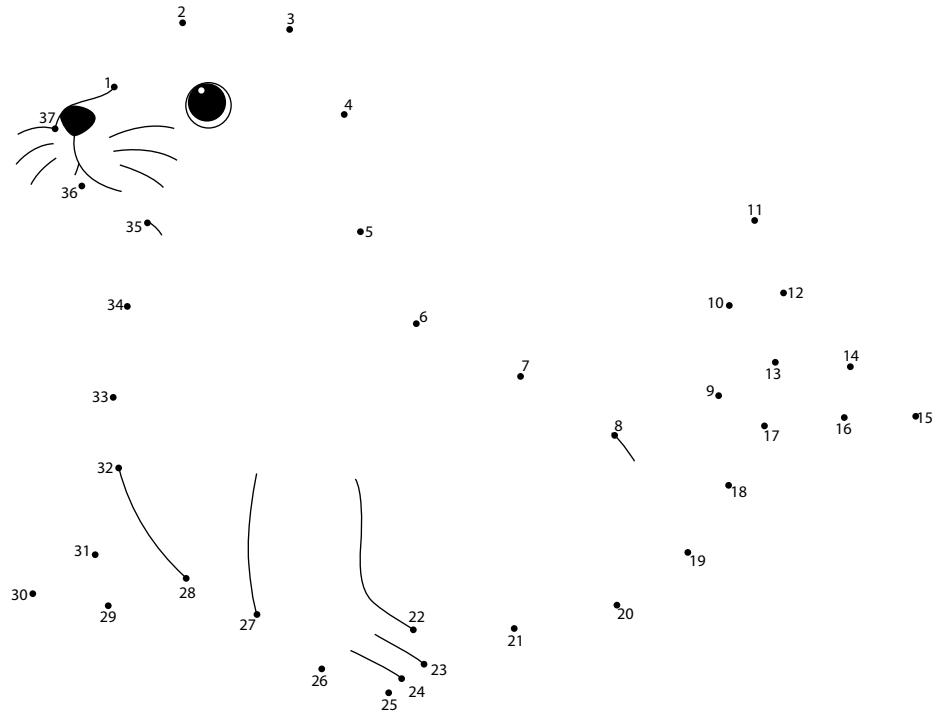

How to Draw a Cat

Drawing is a super fun activity, especially when you're drawing animals! Follow the step-by-step instructions below to learn how to draw a cat. Once you've got the hang of it, get creative with your drawings!

Instructions:

- Start by drawing two curved triangles with a curver in the middle for your cat's ears.
- Next, draw a half circle, from one ear to the other for your cat's head.
- Draw a similar shape inside the ear, just smaller.
- Draw two lines, slightly curved from your cat's head.
- Draw two circles at the bottom of the lines for paws and bring the lines up to finished the cat's back legs.
- Draw two curves with circled at the end for your cat's back legs.

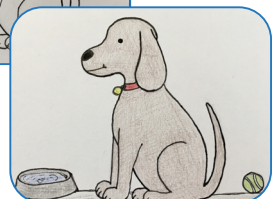
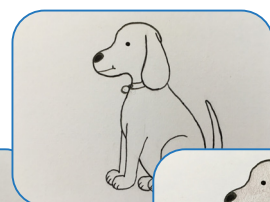
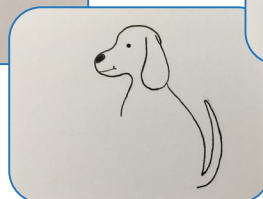
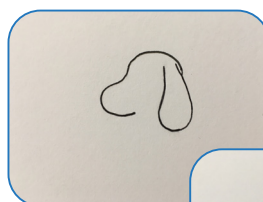
How to Draw a Dog

Instructions:

- Start by drawing a curve like the one above.
- Next, draw another curve to make your dog's muzzle.
- Draw a teardrop shape for your dog's ear.
- Draw your dog's eyes, nose and mouth.
- Extend the line for your dog's muzzle down to create a neck.
- Draw a curve downward for your dog's back.

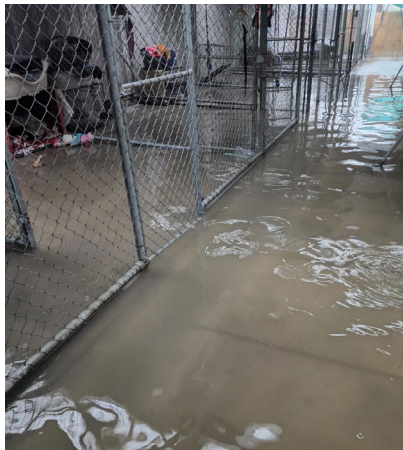
Animals safe after Gisborne SPCA flood rescue

At the beginning of January, heavy rain caused flooding at SPCA's Gisborne Centre - but thanks to quick-thinking helpers, all the animals are safe! The drama unfolded in the adoption room, where a local family was visiting to find a new animal friend when the water started rising.

"Without hesitation, they jumped in to help us," said SPCA Centre Manager Kayla Newman. "They were soaking wet by the end of it, but still positive and wanting to adopt. They were true heroes in that moment and really showed the kindness of our community."

The family helped staff move animals to higher ground while fire and emergency crews arrived to assist. The Centre shared videos of the flooding on Facebook, and soon the community rallied with donations of towels and supplies.

"The response has been overwhelming," Newman said. "We've had so many messages of support, offers to help and people checking in on the animals and our team. It's been really heartwarming."

All the animals are now safe and well, but the clean-up continues. Newman says the best way people can help is by supporting the SPCA in any way they can - adopting, donating, fostering or even sharing their message.

So, if you've ever thought about being an animal hero, now's your chance! SPCA is grateful for every helping hand - and paw!

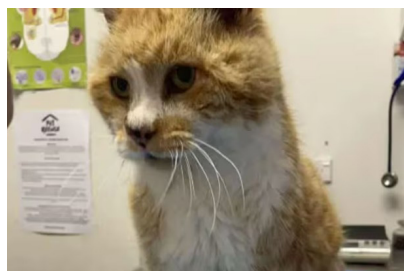
The cat who came home for Christmas - after 14 years

Christmas came early for Paul Myburgh when he got the surprise of a lifetime: his beloved ginger tabby, Mo, returned home after being missing for 14 years.

Mo was adopted from SPCA back in 2010 and quickly became the neighborhood superstar. "He was an incredibly friendly cat," says Paul. "Loved people, and would even walk to the bus stop to greet us!" But Mo's love for attention and treats may have led him astray. One day in 2011, he didn't come home. Paul's family searched everywhere - posters, vets, lost-and-found sites - but Mo had vanished.

Years passed. The family moved houses and sadly accepted that Mo was gone forever. Then, out of the blue, Paul got an email while grocery shopping: Mo had been found! A vet clinic scanned his microchip and matched him to Paul's details. Paul raced to pick him up, and guess what? Mo was still the same curious, food-loving cat - just older and fluffier!

Where was Mo all that time? No one knows for sure. He was found 16 km away and looked like he'd been living rough.

But thanks to his microchip, he's home for Christmas and getting spoiled in his golden years.

If Mo hadn't been microchipped and registered, he might never have made it back. Microchips are tiny, painless and can save your pet's life. So if you have a furry friend, make sure they're chipped - it's the best gift you can give them!

Did you know? Cats can roam up to 20km from home! Microchips are tiny (about the size of a grain of rice) and painless to insert.

Government passes law allowing pig crates to continue

A recent law passed has sparked strong reactions from animal welfare groups, who say it will harm pigs and damage New Zealand's reputation for caring well for animals.

The law allows farmers to keep using farrowing crates - small metal cages that mother pigs (called sows) stay in before and after giving birth. In these crates, sows can stand up and lie down, but they cannot turn around or move freely. Many animal experts say this causes stress and stops the sow from doing natural things, like building a nest for her piglets.

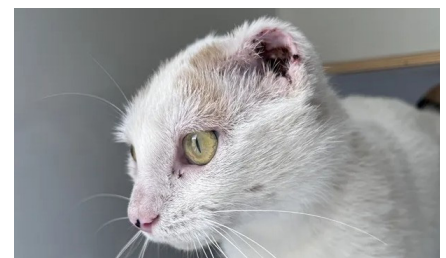
In 2020, the High Court ruled that using these crates was against animal welfare rules. Most people who submitted opinions - about 89% - also said they were against keeping the crates. But the government decided to change the law so the crates could stay.

There are alternatives to pig crates available that allow sows to move more and protect piglets as well, but installing bigger pens can be expensive. SPCA will continue working to end the use of animal cages and push for better treatment of farm animals in the future.

Tilly's tale: a sunny warning for pets

Did you know pets can get skin cancer too? In New Zealand, the sun's harsh rays put animals with white or light fur at higher risk. Areas like ears, noses and mouths are especially vulnerable because they have less fur for protection.

Tilly the cat learned this the hard way. When she came into SPCA's care, her ears were badly damaged by cancer. Vets acted quickly, performing surgery to remove her ear flaps to stop the disease from spreading and to save her life. Today, Tilly is healthy and happy in her forever home.

SPCA says her condition could have been prevented with regular pet-friendly sunscreen. So this summer, keep your furry friends safe: give them shade, avoid the hottest part of the day and always use sunscreen made for pets.

Craft: Cardboard Tube Hay Toy

Did you know that being an animal hero isn't just about caring for pets - it's also about keeping them happy and entertained?

Animals like rabbits and guinea pigs need enrichment to stay healthy and avoid boredom. Enrichment means giving them things to explore, chew and play with - just like toys for us! This easy-to-make cardboard tube toy is the perfect boredom buster for your small animal friends.



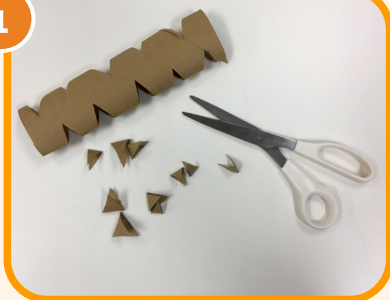
Materials:

- Cardboard tube
- Scissors
- Twine
- Hay



Instructions:

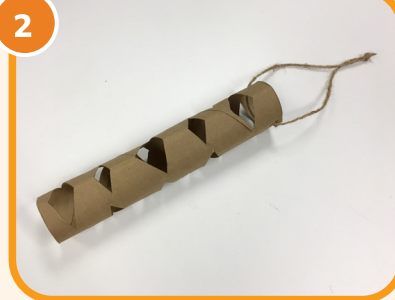
1



Cut diamond shapes along the cardboard tube. Remember to take care when using scissors!

Cut two small holes at one end of the cardboard tube and thread the twine through.

Secure the ends together by tying a knot.



Nature's Heroes

Did you know some animals are like superheroes in the wild? They help their friends, protect their families and use amazing skills to survive. Here are a few incredible examples:



Dolphins care for each other. If one is hurt, others help it swim to the surface so it can breathe.



Kea work together to solve puzzles. Their teamwork and curiosity help them survive in harsh mountain habitats.



Humpback whales have been seen protecting other sea creatures from orcas - even species that aren't their own!



Little Blue Penguins (Kororā) take turns to incubate eggs and feed chicks. They stick together and show amazing loyalty and care.

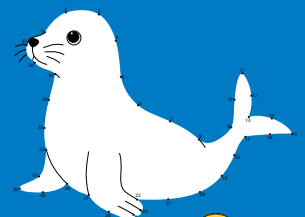
